**Bible Study Guide: John Chapter 6** 

#### Introduction

John 6 is a pivotal chapter that reveals Jesus as the **Bread of Life**, the one who sustains and satisfies our deepest spiritual hunger. The chapter includes three key events:

- 1. **The Feeding of the 5,000** (vv. 1-15) A miraculous sign demonstrating Jesus' power and compassion.
- 2. **Jesus Walking on Water** (vv. 16-21) A display of His divine authority over nature.
- 3. **The Bread of Life Discourse** (vv. 22-71) A profound teaching where Jesus declares Himself the true sustenance from heaven, leading many followers to turn away.

As we study this chapter, we'll explore themes of **faith**, **provision**, **discipleship**, and the cost of following Christ.

### **Study Questions/Lessons**

# 1. The Miracle of the Five Loaves and Two Fish (John 6:1-15)

- Why does Jesus test Philip by asking, "Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?" (v. 5)?
- What does the boy's small offering teach us about God using what we have?
- Why did the crowd want to make Jesus king by force (v. 15), and how does this contrast with His true mission?

## 2. Jesus Walks on Water (John 6:16-21)

- What does this miracle reveal about Jesus' power over creation?
- Why were the disciples afraid, and how does Jesus' response ("It is I; do not be afraid") comfort them (and us)?
- How can we trust Jesus in the midst of life's storms?

#### 3. Seeking Jesus for the Wrong Reasons (John 6:22-27)

- Why were the crowds following Jesus (v. 26)?
- How does Jesus redirect them from seeking temporary bread to eternal life?
- In what ways do we sometimes seek God for selfish reasons rather than for Himself?

### 4. Jesus, the Bread of Life (John 6:28-40)

- What does Jesus mean when He says, "I am the bread of life" (v. 35)?
- How does this contrast with the manna Israel ate in the wilderness (v. 31-33)?
- What does it mean to "come to" and "believe in" Jesus (v. 35)?

# 5. The Cost of Discipleship (John 6:41-66)

- Why were the Jews offended by Jesus' words (vv. 41-42, 52)?
- What does Jesus mean by "eating His flesh and drinking His blood" (vv. 53-58), and how does this relate to communion?
- Why did many disciples turn away (v. 66), and what can we learn from Peter's response (v. 68)?

# 6. Application: Will We Also Go Away? (John 6:67-71)

- When Jesus asks, "Do you want to go away as well?" how does Peter's answer challenge us?
- What does it mean to truly commit to Jesus, even when His teachings are difficult?
- How can we rely on Him as our daily spiritual sustenance?

# **Closing Reflection**

John 6 confronts us with a crucial question: Will we follow Jesus only when it's convenient, or will we cling to Him as the true Bread of Life, even when His ways are hard? Like Peter, may we declare:

"Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." (John 6:68)
